Dear Governor Edwards:

Louisiana has a pollution problem that disproportionately harms the health of Black and Indigenous residents and increasingly warms our planet. As the elected leader of our state, we urge you to take action that is informed by science and ensures equity.

For decades, Louisiana families on the frontlines of toxic industrial facilities, coastal erosion, and the climate crisis have called for a moratorium on governmental approvals that permit toxic pollution in our air and water and subject our lands to the damaging effects of industrial operations. Their calls for a moratorium have not been answered as once historic and livable communities in Louisiana – Reveilletown, Sunrise, Morrisonville, Diamond, Mossville, Bayou Corne, and Isle de Jean Charles – have been displaced by industrial operations and climate-induced sea level rise. Instead, the oil and gas industry along with its derivative plastic manufacturers continue to increase as environmental permits and tax incentives are issued by your administration.

On May 18, 2021, the International Energy Agency joined the call to urge governments and investors around the world to <u>stop fossil fuel projects</u> in order to stave off the worst of the climate crisis. The IEA report shows that we have a narrow window of time to transition to renewable energy and electrification. We do not have time for unproven methods of carbon capture and underground storage being advanced by the same industries that have caused the climate crisis and environmental injustice.

We urge you to direct an all-of-government approach that stops pending and proposed coal, oil, gas, and other greenhouse gas emitting projects. Just as you are leading a way forward on recovery from COVID-19, we ask that you take a stand for advancing equitable solutions to oil, gas, and plastic pollution in Louisiana.

We are here to assist your efforts to achieve environmental justice and climate justice for the people and our future.
