A Woman Who Cares: Jaclyn Trujeque by Sydney Koranyi



Jaclyn Trujeque is a registered nurse (RN) supervisor at the University of New Mexico Hospital (UNMH). She had worked in various units at UNMH for twelve years now.

She graduated from the University of New Mexico in May of 2008 with a degree in Bachelor of Science of Nursing

At the beginning of high school, she wanted to be a doctor, she then realized that nurses spent more one on one time with patients and switched her focus over to becoming a nurse.

At the start of the pandemic, she took on shifts on a covid unit working with patients who tested positive for Covid-19, recovering patients, and patients waiting to receive their test results back. She was then asked to help supervise the now Covid-19 unit, becoming a RN supervisor helping travel nurses.

Jaclyn describes working on a Covid-19 unit as stressful and emotionally taxing. One of the hardest parts of her profession is witnessing patient's health decline, "I try to do everything in my power to help my patients get well and survive, and when all that I do lead to no positive result, it takes an emotional toll on me," Jaclyn said.

Amidst all the hardships, there have been some positive outcomes; one of which is seeing the nursing community come together as whole

and lift one another up; and seeing her patients recover.

For Jaclyn, her passion in helping other keeps her going, she said, "The most rewarding thing about working on a Covid-19 unit is seeing the patients I took care of for months upon months be able to go home to their families."

According to Jaclyn, "Working on a Covid unit makes me think 'did I do everything right, did I keep my family and patients safe.' I always have my constant doubt within me because I care for my patients, my family, and all the people I come across with."

Despite the fear she has with the Covid-19 virus, she will always take the opportunity to help patients and work on the Covid-19 unit in an instant, no matter the risks.

Jaclyn's willingness to help others and learn new ways to treat a still unknown virus is inspiring.








